

NOTABLE TOPOGRAPHICAL FEATURES:

NORTHERN DRAKENSBERG

TUGELA FALLS

Tugela Falls, at the top of the Amphitheatre rock formation, officially ranks as the world's second-highest waterfall, with a total height of approximately 948 meters (3,110 feet). Recent measurements rank it as the world's highest waterfall, surpassing Angel Falls in Venezuela by 4 meters, however this has yet to be confirmed officially. With its five cascading tiers, it offers a natural spectacle that draws visitors from around the world. Hikers can explore several trails to reach the Tugela Falls viewpoint - one of which involves climbing 40 meter-high ladders - where they are rewarded with panoramic vistas of the surrounding mountains and the plunging waters below

THE AMPHITHEATRE

The Amphitheatre is the most iconic and awe-inspiring natural rock formation of the Drakensberg. Stretching approximately 5 kilometers (3.1 miles) in length and rising to heights of over 1,200 meters (3,937 feet), this towering rock wall creates a dramatic backdrop against the surrounding landscape. Carved over millions of years by the forces of erosion, the Amphitheatre offers a stunning display of sheer cliffs, rugged peaks, and several waterfalls, including Tugela Falls and Mahai Falls. It is a popular destination for hikers.

CATHEDRAL PEAK

Cathedral Peak, part of the northern Drakensberg Mountains, earns its name from its striking resemblance to the spires and buttresses of a cathedral. Its towering presence, reaching approximately 3,004 meters (9,856 feet) above sea level, creates an awe-inspiring silhouette against the sky. This geological marvel is a key feature of the Maloti-Drakensberg World Heritage Site, due to both its natural beauty and its cultural significance, San rock art sites being a feature of the area. Hikes to its summit are a popular activity.

CENTRAL DRAKENSBERG

MONK'S COWL AREA

The Monk's Cowl area, nestled within the central region of the Drakensberg , is renowned for its iconic peaks. At the heart of this nature reserve stands Monk's Cowl, a towering sentinel rising to an elevation of approximately 3,229 meters (10,594 feet). Nearby, Cathkin Peak and Champagne Castle add to the area's allure, with Cathkin Peak reaching heights of around 3,181 meters (10,436 feet) and Champagne Castle soaring to approximately 3,377 meters (11,076 feet), making it one of the highest peaks in South Africa. The Monk's Cowl area offers a haven for outdoor enthusiasts, with an extensive network of hiking trails that wind through lush valleys, meandering streams, and pristine forests.





HISTORY OF THE DRAKENSBERG

The history of the Drakensberg area is deeply intertwined with the diverse peoples and cultures that have inhabited the region over thousands of years. 



The Southern Cross is a famous asterism, or shape formed by stars. It consists of the Crux constellation's brightest stars. In astronomical terms, it is an extremely important formation, as it points the way to the South Pole and has been used as a navigational aid for tens of thousands of years.

The Jewel Box: Also in the Crux constellation, this is a young star cluster. It can be seen with the naked eye as a bright, misty object, but when viewed through binoculars, it looks like a collection of blue diamonds.




